The US has a grim history of underrepresenting and inaccurately portraying African American history in schools. A 2015 report conducted by the National Museum of African American History and Culture and Oberg Research found that while most teachers acknowledged the importance of

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teaching Black history, only 8% or 9% of history class time in US schools is devoted to the subject.
